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WSU FINANCIAL CONTEXT

- WSU already has cut \$69 million out of biennial budget in past three years
- Annual average COLA has been only 1.2 percent over the past 10 years
- Collective bargaining agreement with academic student employees is an obligation
- Legislators faced a multi-billion dollar shortfall in operating budget, the result of prior spending exceeding actual growth in state revenues





Legislative Session Outcomes

- 1.5 percent reduction in WSU's state appropriation totaling \$9.9 million
- Partial COLA funding for non-represented employees
- Temporary funding included for WSU Native Coug Scholars program
- No funding for Academic Student Employee contract, ESFCOM accreditation, and selected cuts to turf grass research, Ruckelshaus Center, Murrow News Fellowship
- Washington College Grant kept almost entirely whole for public institutions



On the Horizon

• New budget relies on \$9 billion in new and expanded taxes over four years

FEDERAL UPDATE - Administration

Executive Orders Continue

- What is an executive order? The president's executive power over the government includes the obligation to "take care that the laws be faithfully executed." An executive order is a written directive signed by the president that orders the government to take specific actions to ensure "the laws be faithfully executed."
- It might mean telling the Department of Education to implement a certain rule or declare a new policy priority. <u>Executive orders</u>
 <u>cannot override federal laws and statutes.</u>
- Examples range from making English the official language of the US to requiring OMB to submit a plan reducing federal workforce to rescinding all federal DEI programs.

Changes at Federal Agencies Impact WSU

- USDA: Expecting a significant restructuring
- NSF, NIH & Dept. of Energy: Still have temporary restraining orders in place regarding changes to the indirect costs rates
- Federal employee departures & terminations impact

- Talking to delegation
 - President's message is that our first priority is all of our actions should be taken to protect the students of WSU.
